Governance Failures in India

Very Happy and Prosperous New Year from all at CUTS! In the New Year, your goodwill and good wishes have assumed increasing importance in tiding over governance failures that have compromised our physical and grave financial security.

First, the Mumbai carnage (November 26, 2008) saw the butchering of over 200 civilians and a number of policemen by terrorists barging into the city via an unguarded coastline.

The police were caught unaware – intelligence agencies had not informed them despite being warned – and then let down by their outdated weapons against a technologically savvy enemy.

The investigation revealed the clear hand of Pakistan based terrorists and indicated the support of the Pakistani army. The latter's strong grip over the civilian regime has led to denials of complicity. With war, because of its nuclear implications, not being a viable proposition, a diplomatic offensive and rallying of global economic sanctions remains the only sensible alternative.

On the positive side, crucial issues came to the fore – the need to reequip our police, restructure our intelligence agencies and fortify our coastline. Baby steps have been taken towards setting up of a National Investigation Agency. For the first time, the middle class issued strong messages to the Government and resisted attempts to politicise public sorrow.

While the Mumbai carnage highlighted our physical insecurity, the Rs 7000 crore Satyam scam has compounded financial insecurity sparked off by the global financial meltdown – the outcome of inept management of housing loans and excessive leveraging of credit in the US.

Recipient of prestigious awards for global excellence in corporate governance, Satyam was considered a sound bet by its investors. The scandal not only triggered the free fall of the Sensex but impoverished many who had invested substantially in the company.

The Satyam fiasco bears a strange similarity to the Enron scandal in the US. Satyam's dynamic head, B Ramalinga Raju has till date admitted only to an accounting fraud but preliminary reports seem to point at more serious crimes. Possible attempts to siphon off company wealth to Maytas, an infrastructure company run by his sons, cannot be ruled out. Investigations are still on and many influential heads are set to roll.

While the financial meltdown has affected our economy like others, there are fears, mostly exaggerated, that the Satyam scandal will damage the global credibility of India Inc, especially the IT sector. Our growth rate is projected to come down from nine percent to a still high seven percent – our lack of export dependence, unlike other economies, might save us. However one never knows. As someone wrote to me, watch out for 2010, which maybe worse than 2009. But panicking will make it worse, so let us be sanguine.

However, let me draw your attention to the election of Barack Obama as US's first non-white President – an event hitherto considered highly unlikely in conservative US. On that positive note, let me end with my best wishes.

Get Active

Role in Regulatory Reforms

The objective was to reach out to the farmers, commercial users, distribution companies etc., at the grassroots level in order to make them aware of the role they need to play in regulatory reforms in the electricity sector.

Equity in Trading System

CUTS Geneva Resource Centre (CUTS GRC) with the support of The Flora Hewlett William and

Foundation, US under the project entitled, 'Fostering Equity and Accountability in the Trading System' (FEATS) organised national inception meetings in the five project countries, i.e. in Nairobi (Kenya) on October 14; Kampala (Uganda) on October 15; Dar-Es-Salaam (Tanzania) on October 17; Lusaka (Zambia) on October 20; and in Lilongwe (Malawi) on October 23, 2008 respectively.

The meetings, which were attended by representatives from government departments, private sector and civil society adopted the revised Terms of References for trade policy research and the establishment of five National Reference Groups.

AfT: From Concept to Action

CUTS London Resource Centre (CUTS LRC) in partnership with Nordic Consulting Group, Denmark; German Development Institute, Germany and Inter Church Organisation for Development Cooperation, The Netherlands under the Linkages between Trade, Development and Poverty Reduction (TDP) project organised three workshops in Bonn, on December 01-02; in Copenhagen, on December 04-05; and in Utrecht, on December 09, 2008 respectively.

The workshops aimed to explore challenges related to implementing the 'Aid for Trade'.

Building Women's Capacity

CUTS Centre for International Trade, Economics & Environment (CUTS CITEE), with support from the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, organised a training programme on 'Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs) and Related WTO Issues' in Jaipur, on November 03-07, 2008 with a purpose to build the capacity of women scientists and technologists working with various ministries/ departments/councils/institutes/ research laboratories of Government of India.

The programme aimed at offering training/education on issues related to IPRs that received increasing prominence under the aegis of Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPs) and related domestic legislations.

Energising Regulation

CUTS Africa Resource Centre (CUTS ARC), Nairobi with the support of TrustAfrica organised scoping workshop under a two-year project entitled, 'Competition Policy and Domestic Regulatory Framework in the Energy Sector in Kenya' in Nairobi, on November 20, 2008.

The workshop aimed at seeking views and recommendations from the relevant stakeholders to help finetune and enrich the scope and the Terms of Reference for the project.

Linking Media with EPAs

CUTS ARC, Lusaka in partnership with Caritas Zambia organised a capacity building workshop for media on trade and development issues, in Lusaka, on November 07, 2008.

The objectives of the workshop were to create awareness among media practitioners about the ongoing Economic Partnership Agreement (EPA) negotiations.

Boosting the Consumer Movement in Vietnam

OUTS Hanoi Resource Centre (CUTS HRC), in partnership with the Vietnam Standards and Consumer Protection Association (VINASTAS), and with support from The Ford Foundation, Office for Vietnam and Thailand, organised two training workshops under the project entitled, 'Strengthening the Consumer Movement in Vietnam', in Hai

Phong, on November 18, 2008; and in Vung Tau, Vietnam, on

November 20, 2008 respectively.

While delivering the inaugural address, Dr Doan Phuong, President, VINASTAS pointed out myriad difficulties that the consumer movement in Vietnam is facing. George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS CART participated as a resource person.

The workshops deliberated on legal issues (litigation) as well as the practices of consumer redressal mechanism. There were presentations on legal framework analysis, case studies and hypothetical case handling techniques, with an introduction of Indian system of consumer dispute settlement mechanisms to Vietnam.



Development in South Asia

The 11th Sustainable
D e v e I o p m e n t
Conference was held in
Islamabad, on December
01-03, 2008, with the

overarching theme: 'Peace and Sustainable Development in South Asia: Issues and Challenges of Globalisation'.

The conference explored how the neo-liberal globalisation agenda was intertwined with the peace and security agenda and how peace and sustainable development was threatened by the global challenges. Siddhartha Mitra of CUTS presented a paper, 'Of Peace Dividends and Trade Dividends: The Case of Pakistan and India' at the conference.

Unleashing the Tiger?

Pradeep S Mehta of CUTS attended the conference, 'Unleashing the Tiger? Competition Law in China and Hong Kong' sponsored by premier competition law firm Gilbert + Tobin, the Australian and New Zealand School of Government (ANZSOG), and the Asian Competition Forum (ACF) in Australia on October 04, 2008. Mehta chaired a session.

The conference brought together representatives from the senior ranks of government agencies, legal profession, business sector and academia from Australia, China and Hong Kong to explore the emergence of competition law in China and Hong Kong.
